

Winter (Tourist) Season and Safety Thoughts

It's that time of year in Southwest Florida when all of our seasonal visitors are returning to their winter homes. Visitors are returning to an area that has consistently been voted one of the top places in the country to live, vacation and retire, thanks to our proximity to theme parks, the beauty and history of our state and, of course, our world class beaches, boating, and resorts. Not to mention the fabulous weather.

So what does any of that have to do with bicycling? Everything! Our streets become heavily trafficked. Trails and walkways get more crowded. And the numbers of our pedestrian, bicycling, skating, and other wheeled transportation sources that are out and about skyrocket. This increase in traffic of all types can lead to frustration and anger as we try to navigate to our desired destinations.

The majority of bicycle/vehicle crashes occur during the busy winter months and taper off in June. The lowest risk occurs around August. Predictably, most crashes happen when roads are busiest: weekdays from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Bike accidents in Southwest Florida are in the triple digits September through May. We all need to work together to fix this. Everyone needs to take responsibility for making it safer. I cannot count the number of times I have seen a group of 10 or more riders blow through a red light to make a right turn, or ignore a stop sign at a four-way intersection. These types of riding behaviors are dangerous and inexcusable. Worse yet, on at least two of the occasions the group that violated the rules had their ride captains and safety officers with them.

Most of our riding groups are safe and courteous and follow the rules. If your group is guilty of breaking the

 rules of the road, then you need to stop it immediately. It is dangerous and potentially fatal. Also, remember that if you ride on the roadway, you fall under the same rules as a vehicle on the road.

If you are using a pathway or sidewalk, you are governed by the rules for pedestrians, including not crossing until you have a right to do so (green light, or green crossing light, or the right of way). Also, remember that pedestrians have the right of way over a bicycle on a sidewalk. Pedestrians move slower, and are not as fast or agile as someone on wheels. It is your responsibility to yield to pedestrians.

Lastly, if you are riding a bike in a parking lot, act like a vehicle. Don't speed through, going opposite of traffic, weaving in and out around cars, and cutting through parking spaces. Remember, not all injuries are physical and many riders and drivers can tell you stories of being frightened after a near accident, or of an injury from a careless rider or driver. It takes all of us to help keep the numbers of accidents and injuries low. For the greatest part we riders are not the cause, but we are all responsible for safety.

Ride well, be safe, wear a helmet every time you are on wheels, maintain yourself and your equipment, and enjoy the best of what your area and friends have to offer.
